TKAT INSET

The autumn term commenced with a significant milestone for The Keys Academy Trust. For the first time, our INSET was held in the Palmer Building at the University of Reading, because we have outgrown all of our own school facilities!

It was wonderful to welcome 136 teachers to our INSET session in September, which focused on the implementation of our new assessment software.

The Trust is preparing for a highly focused January INSET day at Alder Grove C of E Primary School. This training will bring together colleagues across roles for tailored sessions designed to enhance professional practice. Alex Powley, Director of Teaching, Learning & School Improvement, will lead on achieving greater depth in writing, focusing on assessment frameworks and curriculum design. EYFS teachers will join Julie Sherrington (Primary English Lead, GLF Schools) for a session on early language development, while SENDCOs will work with John Hewitt (Headteacher, The Castle School) on effective use of support staff and strategies to support pupils with ADHD. This INSET exemplifies the Trust's commitment to equipping staff with the tools to achieve ambitious outcomes for all our pupils.

The Peer Review process has been a powerful example of schools working together to enhance practice. Reviews have celebrated the strengths of teaching teams, including their ability to foster high levels of pupil engagement and to implement strategies that promote effective learning. Themes such as retrieval practice, high-quality questioning, and scaffolding have emerged as consistent strengths across the Trust. Beyond these findings, the process has strengthened relationships, with schools learning from one another to refine approaches and embed impactful change. Improvement champions have been pivotal in translating recommendations into clear, actionable steps, ensuring progress remains focused and purposeful.

This term has also seen the introduction of the Trust's Pupil Premium Strategy, which aims to support disadvantaged pupils through targeted interventions and a focus on Quality First Teaching. Strategies such as daily reading, phonics tutoring, and increased family engagement are being embedded across schools to address barriers to learning. Teachers are being equipped with professional development opportunities to support this work, and plans for an on-demand CPD library and further roundtable sessions will provide ongoing support for staff as they implement these approaches.

Looking ahead, February will see the launch of subject networks, led by subject leaders across TKAT, to deepen subject expertise and foster shared learning. These networks will provide a platform for teachers to collaborate, share best practices, and address shared challenges within their subject areas. The first network, will explore the goals of each subject's curriculum and ensure that all pupils across the Trust experience an equity of aspiration regardless of the school they attend.

This term has also shown the value of partnership in other areas. Schools have collaborated to share best practices and refine approaches in areas such as curriculum planning and supporting inclusive teaching practices. These efforts demonstrate a collective commitment to ensuring high-quality education for all our pupils across the Trust.



Ofsted & SIAMS Inspections

No sooner than we had returned from the half term break Polehampton Juniors got the call from Ofsted. Their Inspection took place on 5-6 November 2024 and we are delighted to confirm that they have secured a 'Good' rating across all four key areas. Shortly afterwards Earley St Peter's had their SIAMS inspection, which also had an excellent outcome. These inspection results are another clear example of partnership across the Trust, which is evident when schools and staff come together to support one another. Inspections also provide great learning opportunities for those likely to be in receipt of their inspections next!



Forest Learning Alliance

The FLA has always worked in collaborative partnerships, ensuring we work across educational boundaries to achieve shared goals for our schools. Since 2013, we have expanded our reach and impact of professional growth. Partnering with 37 alliance schools across all phases and, more excitingly, now as part of The Keys Academy Trust, we aim to continue to create evidence-informed professional development, that is purposefully relevant for our teachers today. We are in an emerging partnership phase and look forward to working with you to offer and provide learning development opportunities for TKAT and profession.

I would like to get to know you and your school and I hope to visit your schools and look forward to meeting you during the upcoming January 2025 INSET. My sincere wish is to establish trust-wide partnerships that we can all embrace in supporting professional growth for everyone.

Another great example of why partnerships are important, was our successful joint application for funding through Wokingham Borough Council's Inclusion Innovation Fund. The £25,000 secured will enable the creation of dedicated spaces in seven of our schools, tailored to support pupils with SEMH or SEND needs. This initiative is a significant step forward in promoting inclusivity and mental wellbeing within our school community.

Thank you to the schools involved who have already taken steps to develop this project within their school.





We kick-started some strong partnerships at Uplands this year with the opening ceremony of our new outdoor classroom. This was a collaboration between the school, PTA and Mace who donated all of the materials, labour and time over the summer to complete the project – an excellent addition to our outdoor learning offer!

Next came our Harvest assembly with generous donations from our parents





for the local food banks and elderly folks in need. We then hosted an afternoon tea for our local elderly

community with Year 6 hosting and entertaining - a wonderful afternoon had by all! We have been sorting our library at Uplands so that

we can access, choose and enjoy the books more easily.



This autumn term has been a shining example of collaboration as we worked together with families, local organisations and community groups to make a positive impact. Here are some highlights from our exciting term of partnership activities.



Harvest Festival

Our term began with the joyful celebration of our Harvest Festival. Pupils, parents and staff gathered to give thanks and share with those in need. Generous donations from our school community were delivered to the Crowthorne food bank, demonstrating the power of collective effort to support those in need in our local area.



TKAT Annual Celebration Service

As a proud member of The Keys Academy Trust (TKAT), we participated in the TKAT Annual Celebration Service. This inspiring event brought together schools across the trust to celebrate our school partnerships and achievements. Our pupils represented St Michael's in what was our first TKAT Annual Celebration Service since joining the trust in November 2023.

Remembrance Memorial Service

In November, we joined the Sandhurst Remembrance Memorial Service to honour those who served and sacrificed for our freedom. Our pupils laid a wreath on behalf of the school and participated in a moving ceremony alongside other members of the local community.

Sporting Partnerships

This term, we continued to work in partnership with local schools and sports organisations to provide a range of competitive and inclusive sports opportunities. Our pupils excelled in football, cross country, boccia and tag rugby - demonstrating teamwork, perseverance and fair play. These events not only allowed our pupils to showcase their skills but also strengthened bonds with peers from other schools.



Enrichment Opportunities

A highlight of our enrichment programme this term was Year 4's visit to the BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir in Neasden. This awe-inspiring trip deepened pupils' understanding of Hinduism as part of our Religious Education curriculum and provided a valuable opportunity to experience cultural and spiritual diversity first-hand.

Raising Money for Children in Need

St Michael's pupils, staff and parents once again showed their compassion and generosity by coming together to raise funds for Children in Need. Through a variety of fun and engaging activities, including cake sales and raffles, we raised a significant amount for this great cause which makes a real difference in the lives of children and families across the UK.

At Crazies Hill CE Primary School, our network of partnerships with others helps us to provide every pupil and adult in our school community with wide ranging opportunities in order to grow in resilience to weather life's ups and downs, have respect for themselves, others and their environment and the ability to build and maintain good working relationships with all in their community so that they can 'be the best that they can be'. These connections help us to fulfill our vision and deepen our understanding of our values of relationships, resilience and respect.



Partnership within our School

School Council - Year 1 to Year 6 each has a representative that sits on the School Council and the Eco Council. The School Council have previously led projects such as creating the Bug Garden, choosing playtime toys using a set budget, meeting with school lunch providers to discuss menus and lunch quality. The representatives lead class council sessions and then share the thoughts of their peers during the school council meetings. The Eco Council is continuing the great work initiated by last year's Councillors as it works towards achieving the Eco-Schools Green Flag Award. This is an international award that recognises educational institutions for their environmental action and learning.



Partnership with St Mary's Wargrave - Harvest Festival

It was lovely to welcome so many of our parents, families and friends to our Harvest Festival. Each class presented and all children sang with confidence in unison and in harmony. We received many generous donations for Woodley Food Bank. We welcomed Richard from Woodley Food Bank and our harvest festival was blessed by Reverend Steve.



Partnership with our PTA - Adventure Playground

We are very fortunate to work in close partnership with such supportive parents who are dedicated to fundraising in order to enhance the experiences for the children. With their support, we have been able to develop our adventure playground space and provide additional equipment and all-weather play space to enhance playtime and lunchtime breaks. Events such as: Race Night, Comedy Night, Spooky Disco, Pyjama party and film night are wonderful ways to bring the community together and fundraise at the same time.



Partnership with our Governors - RE Workshops

Our governors are regularly in school, working with, and supporting the staff and children. Our RE inspired workshop sessions enable governors and pupils to work in partnership to deepen knowledge and understanding through practical activities and discussion work.



Partnership with our Community - Charity Events

In November we welcomed one of our local residents in to school to talk to the children about the importance of remembrance. She brought in photos and artefacts for the children to see as she told stories of family members who had taken part in WW1. The children even saw boots that had been worn in conflict. Di has been a volunteer for The Royal British Legion for over 50 years. She provides our school with poppies to sell each year. This year the School raised £166.24 for The Poppy Appeal, which contributed to the Crazies Hill District fundraising total of £1340.93.

Partnership with our Trust

It was a delight to host this year's Trust Annual Celebration Service at St Mary's Church, Wargrave. Stories, Bible readings, poetry and prayers were amongst the range of presentations from each of the twelve schools in The Keys Academy Trust. The service was such a celebration of partnership within our own schools and across our Trust schools. Our School Choir and Hand Chime Group felt very proud and privileged to be able to lead this service.





At Earley St Peter's CE Primary School, the theme of Partnership is at the heart of our community, bringing together pupils, staff, parents and the wider community to build strong foundations for the future. Our recent SIAMS Inspection (November 2024) also celebrates the strength of Partnerships throughout the school.



Partnerships Within Our School Community

Our commitment to inclusion is a shining example of partnership in action. The recent SIAMS inspection noted, "There is an exceptionally strong sense of inclusion throughout the school. Consequently, pupils and adults feel valued and capable of reaching their full potential." From the dedicated work of our pastoral care and wellbeing team to the creation of nurturing spaces like our enchanted garden and learning bus, we collaborate to ensure every child feels valued and supported which was also highlighted in the report "Professional caring relationships, built on the vision, ensure pupils have confidence in the adults who teach them."



Partnerships Beyond the School

Earley St Peter's is a proud member of The Keys Academy Trust, which provides robust support for governance, professional development and school improvement. This collaboration ensures that our curriculum and teaching practices continue to reflect our vision and deliver excellence. The SIAMS report commended this partnership, stating, "Trustees and governors routinely review policies and practice to ensure that the vision is maintained and remains dynamic."

Our strong connection with Earley St Peter's Church and the parish community enriches our spiritual and educational offerings. Weekly church services and special festivals bring together pupils, parents and clergy, creating a shared sense of belonging. Additionally, local church members contribute to our religious education and extracurricular activities, deepening our pupils' understanding of faith and values. The inspection highlighted that "Collective worship is central to the school community. It strikes a successful balance between achieving inclusion and maintaining Christian distinctiveness."



Partnerships That Inspire Action

Our pupils extend their acts of service and kindness into the wider community. Whether fundraising for local charities like the Royal Berkshire Hospital or participating in initiatives such as litter picking with Earley Town Council, they exemplify the values of our school. The SIAMS report recognised that, "Pupils articulate clearly and naturally how the vision and associated values link to acts of kindness and service. They express an exceptional and intuitive knowledge that this applies to all areas of life."

As we reflect on our successes, we give thanks for the many partnerships that sustain and inspire us. Together, we are building a community where everyone can flourish.





It has been an incredible 2024 for St Cecilia's where we have continued to grow. This term we have welcomed a Nursery and Reception class and they have settled in very well to life at the school.





On Friday 6th December we welcomed friends from the Hurst Gospel Group to the school to run a Christmas extravaganza for our children. Steve, Judi and their team worked with every class teaching them all about the festival of Christmas. The children had opportunities to discuss, perform and explore key passages from the Bible. The children really enjoyed the sessions and learnt a lot!



TKAT Cross Country

On Thursday 24th October, a group of our children went and competed alongside other children from The Keys Academy Trust in Sonning. The children thoroughly enjoyed the experiences with many of them saying how nice it was to be with the other TKAT children. We had some positive results with one child coming 5th in the Year 3/4 girls race and one child coming 4th in the Year 5/6 girls race. All the children competed well and did not give up until they crossed the finish line!





Harvest

This year, once again, our School Council made the decision to team up with Wokingham Foodbank to support the local community in our Harvest Festival. The families in the school were incredibly generous and there was great pride amongst the children that they had helped people within their community. Needless to say the volunteers at the Foodbank were very grateful.







Sonning CE Primary School has enjoyed a number of exciting partnership opportunities this term. From a learning perspective, our pupils in Year 5 enjoyed a trip to The Mill theatre house in Sonning, where they got the opportunity to perform on the theatre stage. This invaluable experience ensured our pupils got a chance to 'tread the boards' and hear their writing come to life. It also meant that, for a number of pupils (including those from disadvantaged backgrounds), they were able to build cultural capital by experiencing something new.



Our school has also enjoyed working with our North Hub colleagues on a number of CPD opportunities, which has benefitted all of our staff and, in turn, the pupils of our schools. This term, we enjoyed CPD sessions on reading, writing and maths.

As well as benefitting from support from within TKAT, we have also been able to lead in some key areas to work in partnership with others. One special event from the last term was our cross country event which we organised for all schools in TKAT. This was held in partnership with Barnes Fitness and Berkshire County Sports Club (BCSC). It was a fantastic event, and one that gave opportunities for a number of pupils from each school to challenge themselves in a sports competition.







We are grateful for this term's partnership opportunities with our TKAT colleagues, and we look forward to continuing this into next term and beyond.





Our Pupil Worship Leaders are working in partnership with Reverend Rickey Simpson-Gray to develop worship themes and prayer areas within our school and community.




We worked in partnership with Kylie Grimes MBE, triple Paralympian and motivational speaker to put the children through their paces, inspire them with a love of exercise, and encourage them to follow their dreams. The event was covered by Wokingham Today and the article can be accessed here. The children's sponsorship raised around £400 which will go towards new sports equipment for our school.





We worked with the Fire Service to teach the children about keeping safe and the vital job that the fire service carries out. The children learnt about the purpose of the loud siren (to let other drivers know that it is an emergency and they need to get there as quickly as possible).





All the children were very excited to see the fire engine on the playground!



As a community, we continue to support Evelyn (one of our Year 6 pupils) with her mission to fund London and Sandhurst Air Ambulance Appeal Air Ambulance by bringing in our plastic bottle tops to school.

Evelyn collects the bottle tops which are then inspected and put into clear plastic bags before they are shipped off to the recycler. The money paid for the bottle tops goes to the London Air Ambulance appeal.

We were very proud of the four children who represented our school at the TKAT Annual Celebration Service in Wargrave. They spoke clearly and were thoughtful and respectful throughout.

A group of KS2 children took part in the TKAT Cross Country Competition. They reported that they had a great time. Working in partnership with the other schools in TKAT means that the children get to take part in additional enrichment opportunities, alongside children from other schools in the trust. We are very grateful for this partnership working.





This term at The Coombes we have nurtured partnerships with our TKAT colleagues and many organisations such as The NSPCC, Wokingham Food Bank, Thames Valley Police, British Legion and many more. We have also continued to benefit from our strong relationships with our community, such as our PTA, school families, local Church team and our local Parish Council. We are proud of the opportunities our partnerships provide our children and the ways in which they help our children and staff to grow a love of learning. We look forward to continuing to work in partnership with you all next term and beyond.





NSPCC - All children took part in an assembly where we learnt that the NSPCC is a charity that works to keep children safe and help protect children's rights. This links with our work on the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child)

Sometimes children have worries. The NSPCC encourages children to **'speak out, stay safe'**. We learnt that we can lighten the load by sharing our worries with safe adults and by talking to child line.



The Coombes PTA - In November we proudly thanked our PTA for their hard work and commitment to our school. Through this partnership with the PTA, we have been able to fundraise and build our new outdoor classroom! Their hard work and commitment to arranging and range of experiences and events is hugely admired and appreciated.





Tray Day - We invited our parents and carers into school to spend time during the school day with their child/ren. During the sessions, parents have the chance to share and discuss the experiences, learning and progress for their child/ren this school year. These events are a great way to foster partnerships with our parents who are all important in the learning and development of each child. It was lovely to have them in!



Wokingham Food Bank and Harvest Festival - Here at The Coombes we work closely with Wokingham Food Bank. We advertise the food bank timetable in our newsletter as well as signpost any families who need their support. During our Harvest Festival in November, families donated a range of non-perishable food which were gratefully received by the Foodbank.





Carolling around the Tree - Our newly formed Choir joined with members of the community and Parish Council members to officially 'light' the village Christmas tree. The school has formed a close partnership with the Parish Council and actively supports a range of events and activities throughout the year.



Partnership with our local community

For Remembrance Day, the children explored its connection to our half-termly focus on Service.
